Summary Tree Preservation Order 10 of 2017 was made as a Provisional Order with immediate

effect and the woodlands will be unprotected unless the TPO is confirmed. As one formal

objection has been made to the TPO, the details are reported for consideration.

confirmed with a minor amendment to the plan.

Background

The order was made on 15 December 2017 to protect a woodland areas within a parcel of land adjacent to Ger y Parc Newport .

One objection has been received:-

Mr Jon Straw Brooklyn Farm Llandevaud Newport NP18 2AE

The main reasons stated with rebuttal are as follows:-

1. Alleged that that the TPO was issued out of "malice" and not to protect trees.

The Tree Preservation Order (TPO) has been made in accordance with the procedure followed by the Council as set out in The Town and Country Planning (Tree) Regulations 1999 which still apply in Wales.

There was evidence on site that a number of trees had been felled and a series of emails from local residents believed that the woodland trees were under threat and that more felling work was to take place over the Christmas Holiday period.

2. That the TPO map is inaccurate regarding the position of the woodland areas.

The woodland areas outlined on the TPO were taken from aerial photographs so it is believed that the woodland areas on the TPO plan are accurate. Mr Straw has been asked to submit mapped evidence to the contrary and if received it will be assessed and amended accordingly.

The woodland areas have been independently surveyed by Azimuth Land Surveys and an amended TPO plan is now submitted.

Newport City Council welcomes proactive management of trees and woodland and positively supports TPO applications to this effect.

Comments of Chief Financial Officer

Comments of Head of Law & Standards - Monitoring Officer

A Local Planning Authority may make a TPO if it is expedient in the interests of amenity to make provision for the preservation of trees or woodland. Trees may be preserved for their intrinsic beauty or contribution to the landscape. There should be a reasonable degree of public benefit and TPOs should only be used to protect trees where their removal would have a significant impact on the environment or upon its enjoyment by the public. Before deciding whether or not to confirm a TPO the Local Planning Authority must consider any objections or representations duly made. An Order may be confirmed with or without modification.

Comments of Head of People and Business Change

The report refers to a Tree Protection Order so there are no staffing implications. TPO's are relevant in meeting the commitment in the Council's wellbeing objectives "To promote economic growth and regeneration whilst protecting the environment." The objections that have been received must be considered before the TPO is confirmed, however the decision is a matter for the Planning Committee to determine

Equalities Impact Assessment and the Equalities Act 2010

The Equality Act 2010 contains a Public Sector Equality Duty which came into force on 06 April 2011. The Act identifies a number of 'protected characteristics', namely age; disability; gender reassignment; pregnancy and maternity; race; religion or belief; sex; sexual orientation; marriage and civil partnership. Wellbeing of Future Generations (Wales) Act 2015

1. LATE REPRESENTATIONS

1.1 The landowner objects to the placement of a blanket TPO on his land for the following reasons:

- The survey remains inaccurate and land which has no trees in it is still included.
- The land in question is being actively managed to create a 'Parkland' environment (open grassy land with scattered groups of trees).
- All required tree works are now completed.
- The land is agricultural land and is being used for that purpose.
- Any remaining trees provide shelter for stock and are located on steep land that it would not be beneficial to clear.
- The TPO will prevent future tree maintenance and will prejudice the long term retention of the remaining trees on the site.
- The TPO will devalue the land significantly and reduce its future value adversely impacting on my pension pot.

2. OFFICE RESPONSE

2.1 The remaining woodland has been accurately surveyed by an external surveying company and any differences from the initial survey are very small. Best practice guidelines have been followed when drafting the Protection Order. Land value is not an issue for consideration when making a TPO.

3. OFFICER RECOMMENDATION

3.1 That the provisional TPO is confirmed.
